Explanations

1. “had left” (b)

In the third conditional, the if-clause uses past perfect: 'If I had left'. This describes a past unreal situation — you didn't leave earlier, so you missed the train.

2. “had studied” (d)

The if-clause uses past perfect even when it comes after the result clause: 'if she had studied'. She didn't study hard — this is an imaginary past situation.

3. “would have seen” (a)

The result clause in the third conditional uses 'would have + past participle': 'they would have seen'. They didn't arrive on time, so they missed the beginning.

4. “would have won” (c)

The result clause uses 'would have + past participle': 'We would have won'. The weather wasn't good, so they didn't win the match. Never use 'will' in third conditional sentences.

5. “had checked” (d)

The if-clause uses past perfect: 'If he had checked'. He didn't check the map, so he got lost. The negative result clause 'wouldn't have got lost' shows what would have been different.

6. “wouldn't have been” (c)

The negative result clause uses 'wouldn't have + past participle': 'I wouldn't have been'. You didn't tell the truth, so I was angry. 'Wouldn't be' is second conditional (present unreal), not third.

7. “had asked” (b)

Past perfect in the if-clause: 'if you had asked'. You didn't ask them, so they didn't help. The result clause 'would have helped' shows the imaginary outcome.

8. “had taken” (a)

Past perfect in the if-clause: 'If we had taken'. We didn't take a taxi, so we arrived late. In the third conditional, the if-clause always uses 'had + past participle'.

9. “would have got” (a)

Result clause: 'He would have got'. He didn't have enough experience, so he didn't get the job. Note the double 'had' in 'had had' — the first is the past perfect auxiliary and the second is the main verb 'have'.

10. “wouldn't have been” (b)

Negative result clause: 'I wouldn't have been late'. The alarm didn't go off, so I was late. Use 'wouldn't have + past participle' for the negative result in the third conditional.

11. “had seen” (d)

Past perfect in the if-clause: 'If she had seen'. She didn't see the email, so she didn't reply. The third conditional always uses past perfect in the if-clause.

12. “had known” (a)

Past perfect in the if-clause: 'if I had known'. I didn't know about the problems, so I bought the car. The negative result 'wouldn't have bought' expresses regret.

13. “would have stayed” (c)

Result clause: 'we would have stayed'. The hotel wasn't cheap enough, so we didn't stay another night. Use 'would have + past participle' for the result.

14. “wouldn't have missed” (c)

Negative result clause: 'They wouldn't have missed'. The traffic was bad, so they missed the flight. Note the negative if-clause 'hadn't been' combined with the negative result 'wouldn't have missed'.

15. “had known” (d)

Past perfect in the if-clause: 'If I had known'. I didn't know you were in hospital, so I didn't visit. This expresses regret about a past situation.

16. “would have enjoyed” (b)

Result clause: 'She would have enjoyed'. She felt ill, so she didn't enjoy the party. 'Would enjoy' would be second conditional (present unreal), but here we're talking about a past event.

17. “hadn't been” (c)

Negative past perfect in the if-clause: 'If the restaurant hadn't been'. The restaurant was crowded, so we waited a long time. Use 'hadn't + past participle' for negative if-clauses.

18. “hadn't rained” (a)

Negative past perfect: 'if it hadn't rained'. It rained, so we didn't go to the beach. In the third conditional, negative if-clauses use 'hadn't + past participle'.

19. “had finished” (b)

Past perfect in the if-clause: 'If the children had finished'. They didn't finish their homework, so the teacher wasn't pleased. Always use 'had + past participle' in the if-clause of the third conditional.

20. “wouldn't have bought” (d)

Negative result clause: 'I wouldn't have bought'. I received a bonus, so I bought the coat. Without the bonus, I wouldn't have bought it. Use 'wouldn't have + past participle' for the negative result.
