## Explanations

### 1. “So did I.” (c)

'Went' is past simple. The auxiliary for past simple is 'did': 'So did I.' Don't use 'was' — 'went' is an action verb, not 'be'.

### 2. “Neither can” (b)

'Can't' is a negative modal verb. We match the modal: 'Neither can her husband.' Use the same modal — don't switch to 'does' or change tense to 'could'.

### 3. “Neither have I.” (d)

'I've never been' uses present perfect (have + past participle). We match with 'Neither have I.' — 'never' makes it negative, so we use 'neither'.

### 4. “Neither did” (a)

'Didn't enjoy' is negative past simple. We match with 'Neither did our friends.' — 'did' is the auxiliary for past simple.

### 5. “So was I.” (d)

'Was born' uses 'was' (past tense of 'be'). We respond with 'So was I.' — matching the past tense auxiliary 'was'.

### 6. “So will” (b)

'Will be' uses the modal 'will'. We match with 'So will Sarah.' — always use the same modal verb in the response.

### 7. “Neither have I.” (b)

'Haven't finished' is negative present perfect. We use 'Neither have I.' — matching 'have' as the auxiliary.

### 8. “So could” (d)

'Could swim' uses the modal 'could' (past ability). We match with 'So could her brother.' — keep the same modal.

### 9. “Neither was” (a)

'Weren't expecting' is past continuous (were + not + -ing). The new subject is 'I', which takes 'was': 'Neither was I.' The auxiliary must agree with the new subject.

### 10. “So should I.” (c)

'Should exercise' uses the modal 'should'. We match with 'So should I.' — don't change the modal to 'do' or 'would'.

### 11. “Neither did” (d)

'Didn't pass' is negative past simple. We match with 'Neither did his classmate.' — 'did' for past simple.

### 12. “So have I.” (a)

'I've already seen' is present perfect (have + past participle). We respond with 'So have I.' — matching the auxiliary 'have'.

### 13. “Neither will” (c)

'Won't be' is negative future (will + not). We match with 'Neither will mine.' — 'will' is the auxiliary.

### 14. “So was I.” (b)

'Was watching' is past continuous (was + -ing). We respond with 'So was I.' — matching the auxiliary 'was'.

### 15. “So must” (d)

'Must leave' uses the modal 'must'. We match with 'So must I.' — keep the exact same modal verb.

**16. “Neither had” (c)**

'Hadn't heard' is negative past perfect (had + not + past participle). We match with 'Neither had we.' — 'had' for past perfect.

**17. “So would I.” (b)**

'Would love' uses the modal 'would'. We respond with 'So would I.' — don't confuse 'would' with 'will' or 'do'.

**18. “Neither could” (d)**

'Couldn't find' is negative past modal (could + not). We match with 'Neither could they.' — use the same modal 'could'.

**19. “So has” (a)**

'Has visited' is third-person present perfect. We match with 'So has her sister.' — 'has' for third-person singular.

**20. “Neither was” (c)**

'Wasn't at the party' uses 'be' in past tense (was + not). 'His girlfriend' is singular, so we use 'was': 'Neither was his girlfriend.'
