Explanations

1. “so” (b)

Use 'so' before an adjective without a noun. 'Nice' is an adjective standing alone, so we say 'so nice'.

2. “such a” (a)

Use 'such a' before a singular countable noun phrase. 'Beautiful day' is an adjective + singular noun, so we say 'such a beautiful day'.

3. “so” (d)

Use 'so' before an adverb. 'Fluently' is an adverb, so we say 'so fluently'.

4. “such” (b)

Use 'such' before a plural noun phrase. 'Kind people' is adjective + plural noun, so we say 'such kind people' (no 'a' with plurals).

5. “such a” (a)

Use 'such a' before a singular countable noun phrase. 'Tall building' is adjective + singular noun, so we need 'such a'.

6. “so” (c)

Use 'so' before an adverb. 'Slowly' is an adverb, so we say 'so slowly'.

7. “such a” (d)

Use 'such a' before a singular countable noun phrase. 'Lovely voice' is adjective + singular noun.

8. “so” (b)

Use 'so' before an adjective without a noun. 'Hot' is an adjective standing alone.

9. “such a” (a)

Use 'such a' before a singular countable noun phrase. 'Wonderful time' is adjective + singular countable noun.

10. “such” (d)

Use 'such' (without 'a') before an uncountable noun. 'Weather' is uncountable, so we say 'such good weather', not 'such a good weather'.

11. “so” (d)

Use 'so' before an adjective without a noun. 'Boring' is an adjective standing alone, so we say 'so boring'.

12. “such a” (b)

Use 'such a' before a singular countable noun phrase. 'Delicious meal' is adjective + singular noun.

13. “so” (a)

Use 'so' before an adjective without a noun. 'Happy' is an adjective standing alone.

14. “such” (d)

Use 'such' (without 'a') before an uncountable noun. 'Advice' is uncountable, so we say 'such useful advice'.

15. “so” (c)

Use 'so' before an adverb. 'Carelessly' is an adverb, so we say 'so carelessly'.

16. “such a” (a)

Use 'such a' before a singular countable noun phrase. 'Terrible noise' is adjective + singular countable noun. Although 'noise' can sometimes be uncountable, here 'a noise' refers to a specific instance.

17. “so” (b)

Use 'so' before an adjective without a noun. 'Tired' is an adjective standing alone.

18. “such an” (c)

Use 'such an' before a singular countable noun phrase starting with a vowel sound. 'Interesting book' starts with a vowel sound, so we need 'such an'.

19. “such” (b)

Use 'such' before a plural noun phrase. 'Comfortable shoes' is adjective + plural noun, so we say 'such comfortable shoes' (no 'a' with plurals).

20. “so” (d)

Use 'so' before an adjective without a noun. 'Difficult' is an adjective standing alone, so we say 'so difficult'.
