Explanations

1. “mustn't” (d)

'Mustn't' means it is prohibited — you are not allowed to do it. Smoking in a hospital is forbidden by law.

2. “don't have to” (b)

'Don't have to' means it is not necessary. The concert is free, so buying a ticket is optional, not forbidden.

3. “mustn't” (c)

'Mustn't' = prohibition. Using phones during an exam is forbidden and has serious consequences.

4. “doesn't have to” (d)

'Doesn't have to' means it is not necessary. Her husband is already cooking, so she doesn't need to.

5. “mustn't” (a)

'Mustn't' = prohibition. Touching paintings in a museum is forbidden because it can damage the artwork.

6. “don't have to” (d)

'Don't have to' = no obligation. The dress code is casual, so wearing a suit is not required (but you can if you want).

7. “mustn't” (b)

'Mustn't' = prohibition. Running a red light is against the law and dangerous.

8. “doesn't have to” (c)

'Doesn't have to' = not necessary. It's a holiday, so there is no obligation to wake up early.

9. “mustn't” (a)

'Mustn't' = prohibition. Parking in a no-parking zone is not allowed.

10. “don't have to” (d)

'Don't have to' = no obligation. The meeting is optional, so attending is your choice.

11. “mustn't” (c)

'Mustn't' = prohibition. It is forbidden for children to play near the pool unsupervised because it's dangerous.

12. “don't have to” (a)

'Don't have to' = not necessary. Food is already provided, so bringing your own is not required.

13. “mustn't” (b)

'Mustn't' = prohibition. Lying in court (perjury) is a criminal offence.

14. “doesn't have to” (d)

'Doesn't have to' = not necessary. The company licence already covers the software, so no payment is needed.

15. “mustn't” (a)

'Mustn't' = prohibition. Feeding zoo animals is forbidden because it can harm them.

16. “doesn't have to” (c)

'Doesn't have to' = no obligation. Tom is free to choose whether to come — it's not required.

17. “mustn't” (b)

'Mustn't' = prohibition. Copying is cheating and is strictly forbidden.

18. “don't have to” (a)

'Don't have to' = not necessary. The fabric doesn't wrinkle, so ironing is not needed.

19. “mustn't” (c)

'Mustn't' = prohibition. Opening the door is forbidden because it will trigger the alarm.

'Don't have to' = not necessary. There is plenty of time, so hurrying is not required.
