# Explanations

**1. “to” (c)**

Use 'to' + infinitive verb to express purpose: 'to buy' means 'in order to buy'.

**2. “for” (b)**

Use 'for' + noun to express the purpose of an object: 'for dry skin' tells us what the cream is designed for.

**3. “for” (d)**

Use 'for' + noun when describing what something is needed for: 'for all these books' tells us the bag's purpose.

**4. “to” (a)**

Use 'to' + infinitive to express the purpose of an action: 'to invite' explains why she called.

**5. “to” (c)**

Use 'to' + infinitive verb to express purpose: 'to travel' explains why he is saving money.

**6. “for” (a)**

Use 'for' + gerund (-ing form) to describe the purpose of a tool or object: 'for learning' tells us what the app is used for.

**7. “for” (d)**

Use 'for' + gerund (-ing form) to describe the function of a tool: 'for opening jars' tells us what the tool does.

**8. “to” (b)**

Use 'to' + infinitive to express purpose: 'to have a cup of coffee' explains why we stopped.

**9. “for” (c)**

Use 'for' + noun to express what something is intended for: 'for the wedding' tells us the occasion.

**10. “to” (a)**

Use 'to' + infinitive to express purpose: 'to study' explains why they went to the library.

**11. “to” (d)**

Use 'to' + infinitive to express purpose: 'to check' explains why the computer was turned on.

**12. “for” (b)**

Use 'for' + noun to describe the purpose of a place or thing: 'for meetings and presentations' tells us the room's function.

**13. “to” (b)**

Use 'to' + infinitive to express purpose: 'to catch the first train' explains why he left early.

**14. “for” (d)**

Use 'for' + noun to ask about something designed to deal with a problem: 'for a headache' means 'to treat a headache'.

**15. “for” (a)**

Use 'for' + gerund to describe the function of an instrument: 'for measuring temperature' tells us what the thermometer does.

**16. “to” (c)**

Use 'to' + infinitive to express purpose: 'to get some milk' explains the reason for going.

**17. “for” (b)**

Use 'for' to indicate the beneficiary — the people the meal was prepared to benefit: 'for the guests'.

**18. “to” (d)**

Use 'to' + infinitive to express purpose: 'to rest her legs' explains why she sat down.

**19. “to” (a)**

Use 'to' + infinitive to express purpose: 'to help their son' explains why they hired a tutor.

**20. “for” (d)**

Use 'for' + gerund to ask about the purpose or effectiveness of something: 'for losing weight' describes the goal.
