# Explanations

## 1. “promised” (c)

'I'll definitely' with strong personal commitment signals a promise. 'Promise + to-infinitive' is the correct pattern. 'Agree' means saying yes to someone else's proposal.

## 2. “threatened” (c)

The speaker is making a negative warning — this is a threat. 'Threaten + to-infinitive' is correct. 'Warn' would need a different structure: 'warned me that she would call...'

## 3. “suggested” (c)

'Why don't we...?' is a suggestion for a group activity. 'Suggest + -ing' is correct. 'Recommend' implies stronger personal advice based on expertise.

## 4. “apologized” (b)

'I'm sorry' is an apology. 'Apologize for + -ing' is the correct pattern. 'Admit' focuses on accepting fault, but doesn't convey the 'sorry' element.

## 5. “refused” (b)

'No, I won't' is a direct refusal. 'Refuse + to-infinitive' is correct. 'Deny' means to say something is not true, which is a different meaning.

## 6. “warned” (c)

'Be careful' signals a warning about danger. 'Warn + person + that clause' is correct. 'Told' is too neutral for a warning about safety.

## 7. “agreed” (d)

'OK' shows acceptance of a request — this is agreement. 'Agree + to-infinitive' is correct. 'Promise' implies a stronger personal commitment; 'OK' signals acceptance.

## 8. “recommended” (a)

'I really think you should' expresses strong personal advice — this is a recommendation. 'Recommend + -ing' is correct. 'Suggest' is more neutral and tentative.

## 9. “denied” (b)

The speaker says something is not true. 'Deny + -ing' means to say you didn't do something. 'Refuse' means to say no to a request — different meaning.

## 10. “offered” (c)

'Let me...' is a voluntary offer of help. 'Offer + to-infinitive' is correct. 'Agree' means saying yes to someone else's request, not volunteering.

## 11. “complained” (d)

The speaker is expressing strong dissatisfaction. 'Complain about + noun' is correct. 'Mention' is too casual for such strong negative feelings.

## 12. “insisted” (b)

'You must' shows strong demand. 'Insist + that clause' (with subjunctive or 'should') is correct: 'insisted that we pay'. 'Suggest' and 'recommend' are too mild for 'you must'.

## 13. “admitted” (d)

The speaker accepts something is true. 'Admit + -ing' means to accept that you did something wrong. 'Confess to' implies a more serious wrongdoing.

**14. “explained” (d)**

The speaker is giving a reason. 'Explain + that clause' is correct. 'Claim' implies doubt about the truth. 'Told' needs a person object.

**15. “claimed” (a)**

The speaker makes a statement that seems doubtful or hard to believe. 'Claim + that clause' is used for assertions that may not be accepted as true.

**16. “reminded” (a)**

'Don't forget' signals a reminder. 'Remind + person + that clause' is correct. 'Tell' is too neutral for this context.

**17. “asked” (d)**

'Please' signals a polite request. 'Ask + person + not to + infinitive' is the correct pattern. 'Told' implies authority, but 'please' makes this a request.

**18. “threatened” (b)**

The speaker is threatening legal action. 'Threaten + to-infinitive' is the correct pattern. The tone is hostile, which distinguishes a threat from a warning.

**19. “mentioned” (a)**

The word 'actually' and the casual tone suggest this is a brief, incidental remark. 'Mention + that clause' or 'mention + -ing' is correct for brief references.

**20. “ordered” (a)**

The exclamation mark and imperative form show this is a strong command, not a polite request. 'Order + person + to-infinitive' captures the forcefulness.
