# Explanations

## 1. “where I worked” (b)

Three changes: (1) remove 'do', (2) change to statement word order (I worked, not do I work), (3) backshift 'work' → 'worked'. The question word 'where' stays.

## 2. “if I had ever been to Australia” (a)

Yes/no question → add 'if'. Statement word order: 'I had been' (not 'had I'). Backshift: 'have been' → 'had been'. 'That' is wrong — it's for statements.

## 3. “was leaving ... that day” (b)

Present continuous 'are leaving' → past continuous 'was leaving'. 'Today' → 'that day'. Both tense and time expression must shift.

## 4. “could ... there the next day” (a)

Four changes needed: 'can' → 'could', 'you' → 'I', 'me' → 'her', 'here' → 'there', 'tomorrow' → 'the next day'. Only option A applies all changes correctly.

## 5. “had taught” (a)

'Who' is the subject of this question (who did the teaching), so word order stays the same. 'Taught' (past simple) backshifts to 'had taught' (past perfect). 'You' → 'me'.

## 6. “whether” (a)

With 'or' presenting two choices, 'whether' is preferred over 'if'. 'Do you want' → 'I wanted' (remove 'do', backshift, change pronoun).

## 7. “wanted to know” (d)

'Wanted to know' is a reporting verb for questions. 'Told me', 'said', and 'mentioned' report statements, not questions. 'Your' → 'my'.

## 8. “would ... that night” (a)

'Will' → 'would' and 'tonight' → 'that night'. Both the modal and the time expression must shift.

## 9. “hadn't replied” (d)

Present perfect negative 'hasn't replied' backshifts to past perfect negative 'hadn't replied'. 'My' → 'his'. The negative is preserved.

## 10. “spoke” (d)

Remove 'does' and backshift: 'speak' → 'spoke'. 'Wondered' is used because the reporter was asking internally. Word order: 'she spoke' (statement order).

## 11. “had been doing ... the night before” (b)

Past continuous 'were doing' → past perfect continuous 'had been doing'. 'Last night' → 'the night before'. Both must shift.

## 12. “hadn't locked” (d)

Negative question: remove 'didn't' and backshift to past perfect negative: 'didn't lock' → 'hadn't locked'. The negative is preserved in the reported form.

## 13. “was coming ... that weekend” (c)

'Who' is the subject (no word order change needed). 'Is coming' → 'was coming'. 'This weekend' → 'that weekend'. Two changes required.

**14. “should” (c)**

'Should' is already a past-form modal and does not change further. 'I' → 'he'. Word order: 'where he should park'.

**15. “had been waiting long” (b)**

Present perfect continuous 'have been waiting' → past perfect continuous 'had been waiting'. The adverb 'long' stays at the end.

**16. “whether” (c)**

With 'or' presenting alternatives, 'whether' is preferred. 'Is' → 'was'.

**17. “had to ... the next day” (b)**

'Must' → 'had to', 'I' → 'she', 'tomorrow' → 'the next day'. Three changes needed.

**18. “couldn't ... that” (d)**

'Can't' → 'couldn't', 'we' → 'they', 'this' → 'that'. Three changes needed.

**19. “had paid” (c)**

Remove 'did' and backshift: 'paid' (past simple) → 'had paid' (past perfect). 'You' → 'I', 'your' → 'my'. Word order: 'how much I had paid'.

**20. “She asked when I would know if I had got the job, and whether I would call her as soon as I heard.” (c)**

This complex sentence requires multiple changes. 'When will you know' → 'when I would know' (word order + backshift). 'You got' → 'I had got' (backshift). 'Will you call' → uses 'whether' (second yes/no question with implied alternative). 'Me' → 'her'. 'You hear' → 'I heard'. Only option C applies all changes correctly.
