Explanations

1. “At” (a)

'At this time tomorrow' is a fixed expression indicating a specific moment in the future.

2. “at” (b)

Use 'at' with specific clock times: at 7 pm.

3. “When” (c)

'When' introduces the time clause marking a specific moment. The driving will be in progress when the call happens.

4. “all” (d)

'All day' emphasizes continuous action throughout the day.

5. “In” (a)

'In an hour' means one hour from now. 'In + time period' is the correct expression for duration from the present moment.

6. “relaxing” (b)

'This time next week' + Future Continuous requires the -ing form.

7. “during” (c)

'During' is used with nouns (the evening) to show when an action occurs.

8. “At” (d)

Use 'at' with specific times like midnight, noon, and clock times. 'At midnight' pinpoints the exact moment.

9. “in” (a)

'In + time period' indicates time from now until the action.

10. “When” (b)

'When' marks the point at which the presenting will be in progress.

11. “next” (c)

'At this time next month' is a common Future Continuous time expression.

12. “between” (d)

'Between X and Y' shows the time range when the action will be happening.

13. “When” (a)

'When' introduces the specific moment at which the cooking will already be in progress. 'During' requires a noun, and 'Since' refers to a starting point in the past.

14. “I'll be flying to Paris” (b)

'This time tomorrow' requires Future Continuous to show ongoing action.

15. “all” (c)

'All night' emphasizes the continuous nature of sleeping through the night.

16. “In” (d)

'In two hours' means two hours from now. 'In + time period' expresses duration from the present to a future point.

17. “when” (a)

'When we arrive' marks the specific moment at which the waiting will be in progress. 'During' requires a noun, not a clause.

18. “At” (b)

Use 'at' with specific times like noon, midnight, and clock times. 'At noon' pinpoints the exact moment.

19. “will be living” (c)

'This time next year' signals a future point requiring Future Continuous.

20. “at” (d)

Use 'at' with specific clock times like 8 o'clock.
