Explanations

1. “just” (b)

'Just' means something happened very recently (a moment ago).

2. “yet” (a)

'Yet' is used in questions to ask about expected events.

3. “already” (a)

'Already' indicates something has happened before now. 'Three times' shows repeated past experience, not a single recent event.

4. “yet” (d)

'Yet' is used in negative sentences for things we expect to happen.

5. “just” (a)

'Just' indicates the action happened very recently.

6. “yet” (b)

'Yet' is used at the end of questions about expected completions.

7. “just” (a)

'Just' emphasizes how recently something happened.

8. “already” (a)

'Already' emphasizes that something has happened, perhaps surprisingly.

9. “yet” (a)

'Yet' is used in negatives when we expect something to happen.

10. “just” (d)

'Just' indicates the train arrived moments ago.

11. “yet” (d)

'Yet' is used in questions when asking about expected events.

12. “already” (b)

'Already' shows the action is completed, possibly before expected.

13. “just” (a)

'Just' emphasizes the very recent arrival.

14. “yet” (c)

'Yet' in negatives indicates the decision hasn't been made but is expected.

15. “already” (a)

'Already' indicates the action is complete, perhaps earlier than expected.

16. “yet” (b)

'Yet' is used in questions about expected events.

17. “already” (d)

'Already' shows something has happened before now. 'Several times' indicates multiple past experiences.

18. “just” (a)

'Just' emphasizes the very recent delivery.

19. “yet” (d)

'Yet' in negatives shows the project completion is still pending.

20. “already” (a)

'Already' indicates the task is done, implying preparation is complete.
