Explanations

1. “to work” (b)

The verb 'ask' follows the pattern 'ask + object + to-infinitive'. 'The teacher asked the students to work' is correct.

2. “to buy” (a)

The to-infinitive can express purpose — why someone does something. 'She went to the supermarket to buy vegetables' = she went there for the purpose of buying vegetables.

3. “to stay” (c)

The verb 'allow' follows the pattern 'allow + object + to-infinitive'. 'My parents don't allow me to stay out late' is correct.

4. “in order to avoid” (d)

'In order to + infinitive' is a formal way to express purpose. 'We left early in order to avoid the traffic' is correct. 'In order to' can replace the simple 'to' of purpose.

5. “to submit” (a)

The verb 'tell' follows the pattern 'tell + object + to-infinitive'. 'The boss told everyone to submit' is correct.

6. “to lock” (b)

The verb 'remind' follows the pattern 'remind + object + to-infinitive'. 'She reminded him to lock' is correct.

7. “in order to” (c)

'In order to + infinitive' expresses purpose. 'He exercises in order to stay healthy' is correct. Note: 'for to' is not standard English, and 'for' requires a noun, not a verb.

8. “to drink” (d)

The verb 'advise' follows the pattern 'advise + object + to-infinitive'. 'The doctor advised her to drink' is correct.

9. “not to walk” (a)

To make a to-infinitive negative, put 'not' before 'to'. The pattern is 'warn + object + not to + infinitive'. 'She was warned not to walk alone' is correct.

10. “to attend” (b)

The verb 'invite' follows the pattern 'invite + object + to-infinitive'. 'They invited us to attend' is correct.

11. “to join” (c)

The verb 'persuade' follows the pattern 'persuade + object + to-infinitive'. 'He persuaded his friend to join' is correct.

12. “so as not to” (d)

'So as not to + infinitive' expresses negative purpose — to prevent something from happening. 'She put on a coat so as not to catch a cold' is correct. 'In order not to' is also acceptable.

13. “to be” (a)

The verb 'expect' follows the pattern 'expect + object + to-infinitive'. 'I expect you to be on time' is correct.

14. “to fasten” (b)

The verb 'remind' follows the pattern 'remind + object + to-infinitive'. 'The sign reminds drivers to fasten' is correct.

15. “to ride” (c)

The verb 'teach' follows the pattern 'teach + object + to-infinitive'. 'She taught her daughter to ride' is correct.

16. “to participate” (d)

The verb 'encourage' follows the pattern 'encourage + object + to-infinitive'. 'They encouraged the students to participate' is correct.

17. “to study” (a)

The to-infinitive can express purpose. 'He went to the library to study' = he went there for the purpose of studying.

18. “to stop” (b)

The verb 'tell' follows the pattern 'tell + object + to-infinitive'. 'The officer told the driver to stop' is correct.

19. “in order not to” (c)

'In order not to + infinitive' expresses negative purpose. 'She took a taxi in order not to be late' is correct. 'So as not to' is also acceptable.

20. “to give” (d)

The verb 'want' follows the pattern 'want + object + to-infinitive'. 'My manager wants me to give a presentation' is correct.
