Explanations

1. “am” (a)

'Right now' tells us the sentence is in the present. Use 'am' with 'I'. I am tired right now.

2. “wasn't” (b)

'Yesterday' tells us the sentence is in the past. 'She' is singular, so use 'wasn't'. She wasn't at home yesterday.

3. “were” (c)

'Born' always uses past tense 'be'. Use 'were' with 'you'. Where were you born?

4. “are” (d)

'On Sundays' describes a regular, general fact (present). 'The shops' is plural, so use 'are'. The shops are closed on Sundays.

5. “was” (a)

'When the war started' places the sentence in the past. 'He' is singular, so use 'was'.

6. “are” (b)

'They work...' (present tense) tells us this is about now. 'My parents' is plural, so use 'are'.

7. “were” (c)

'Last night' tells us the sentence is in the past. 'A lot of people' is plural, so use 'were'.

8. “was” (d)

'When I was young' tells us the sentence is about the past. Use 'was' with 'I'. I was not very good at maths.

9. “is” (a)

'Today' and 'Let's go' tell us the sentence is about now. Use 'is' with 'it'. It is very hot today.

10. “were” (b)

'Yesterday morning' tells us the sentence is in the past. 'We' is plural, so use 'were'.

11. “Was” (c)

'Last weekend' and 'it rained' tell us this is about the past. 'The weather' is singular, so use 'Was'.

12. “are” (d)

'You should read them' is a present recommendation. 'These books' is plural, so use 'are'.

13. “is” (a)

The reply 'It's on King Street' (present) tells us the question is about now. 'Your office' is singular, so use 'is'.

14. “was” (b)

'Yesterday' and 'didn't come' tell us the sentence is in the past. 'Tom' is singular, so use 'was'.

15. “are” (c)

'In this town' describes a general fact (present). 'The streets' is plural, so use 'are'.

16. “was” (d)

'During the war' tells us the sentence is about the past. 'My grandmother' is singular, so use 'was'.

17. “Are” (a)

The reply 'I love it!' (present) tells us the question is about now. Use 'Are' with 'you'.

18. “were” (b)

'When we arrived' (past) tells us the sentence is about the past. 'All the windows' is plural, so use 'were'.

19. “am” (c)

'I am sorry' expresses how you feel right now — the apology is in the present, even though what happened was in the past.

20. “Is” (d)

'Near here' and the reply 'there's one' (present) tell us the question is about now. Use 'Is' with singular 'there' (a cinema).
