# Explanations

## 1. “Do” (c)

Use 'Do' with action verbs like 'like'. 'Are' is for adjectives or nouns (Are you hungry?), not action verbs. Do you like Italian food?

## 2. “Is” (a)

Use 'Is' with nouns and adjectives (she + a doctor). Don't use 'Does' here — there is no action verb. Is she a doctor?

## 3. “were” (b)

Use 'were' with adjectives. 'Tired' is an adjective, so we need the verb 'be'. They were tired after the long walk.

## 4. “Did” (d)

Use 'Did' with action verbs in the past. 'Go' is an action verb, so we need 'Did', not 'Were'. Did you go to the cinema last night?

## 5. “doesn't” (a)

'Like' is a verb, so use 'doesn't' (not 'isn't'). He doesn't like getting up early.

## 6. “Is” (c)

There is no action verb — 'at home' is a location phrase. Use 'Is' (verb 'be'). Is your brother at home right now?

## 7. “were” (b)

'Born' is used with 'be' (I was born / you were born). Don't say 'did you born'. Where were you born?

## 8. “do” (d)

This is the emphatic 'do' — used to add emphasis or insistence. I DO know the answer, I promise!

## 9. “was” (a)

'Happy' is an adjective, so use 'was' (past of 'be'). She was happy about the news yesterday.

## 10. “Do” (b)

'Have' is a verb, so use 'Do' to form the question. Don't say 'Are they have'. Do they have any children?

## 11. “am” (c)

'Hungry' is an adjective. Use 'am' (verb 'be') with adjectives. Don't say 'I do hungry'. I am hungry.

## 12. “Does” (d)

'Close' is an action verb here, and 'the shop' is singular, so use 'Does'. Does the shop close at 6 pm?

## 13. “were” (a)

No action verb — 'in London' is a location. Use 'were' (past of 'be'). We were in London last year.

## 14. “does” (d)

This is the emphatic 'does' — used with he/she/it to add emphasis. She really DOES work hard!

## 15. “Were” (b)

No action verb — 'at the meeting' is a location phrase. Use 'Were' (past of 'be'). Were you at the meeting yesterday?

## 16. “doesn't” (c)

'Speak' is an action verb. Use 'doesn't' for present simple negatives. He doesn't speak Spanish, but he speaks French very well.

**17. “Are” (a)**

'Ready' is an adjective. Use 'Are' (verb 'be') with adjectives. Don't say 'Do the children ready'. Are the children ready for school?

**18. “do” (d)**

'Visit' is an action verb, so use 'do' to form the question. How often do you visit your grandparents?

**19. “am” (b)**

'Ready' is an adjective. Use 'am' (verb 'be'). I am not ready yet. (Short form: I'm not ready yet.)

**20. “Did” (c)**

'Enjoy' is an action verb in the past, so use 'Did'. Don't say 'Was she enjoy'. Did she enjoy the party last weekend?
