Explanations

1. “had” (a)

Use 'had' for past possession. 'When I was young' tells us this is the past. We had a dog called Max.

2. “had” (b)

Use 'had' for past descriptions. 'When she was a child' tells us this is the past. She had long hair.

3. “had” (c)

Use 'had' for past possession. 'Before they moved' tells us this is the past. They had a small flat.

4. “had” (d)

Use 'had' for past experiences. 'Last night' = past. 'Had a great time' is the past of 'have a great time'.

5. “didn't” (a)

Use 'didn't have' for past negatives. We didn't have a car when I was growing up.

6. “didn't” (b)

Use 'didn't have' for past negatives. 'At first' suggests an earlier time. She didn't have any friends at first.

7. “Did” (c)

Use 'Did + subject + have' for past questions. 'Last summer' = past. Did you have a good holiday?

8. “Did” (d)

Use 'Did + subject + have' for past questions. 'When he was a kid' = past. Did he have a bicycle?

9. “had” (a)

Use 'had' for past actions. 'Last Friday' tells us this is the past. We had a lovely dinner.

10. “didn't” (b)

Short answer to 'Did they have...?' → 'No, they didn't.' Use past tense in the answer.

11. “ve got” (c)

For current possession, use 'have got' (= 've got). 'It's really fast' shows this is now. I've got a new laptop.

12. “has” (d)

'Have breakfast' is a daily routine (action), not possession. Use 'has' with she — not 'has got' for actions.

13. “haven't got” (a)

'Can you buy some?' shows this is now. For current possession (negative) with we, use 'haven't got'.

14. “Did” (b)

'When he was young' = past. Use 'Did + subject + have' for past questions.

15. “had” (c)

'Yesterday' = past. Use 'had' for past states. He had a terrible headache yesterday.

16. “have” (d)

After 'Do you', use the base form 'have'. Do you have any questions? (NOT 'Do you have got')

17. “Has” (a)

With 'have got', form questions as 'Has she got...?' for he/she/it.

18. “had” (b)

'Last night' = past. Use 'had'. I had a really bad dream last night.

19. “have” (c)

After 'don't', use the base form 'have'. They don't have enough money. (NOT 'don't have got')

20. “has got” (d)

For current possession with singular subjects (my cat = it), use 'has got'. My cat has got beautiful green eyes.
